

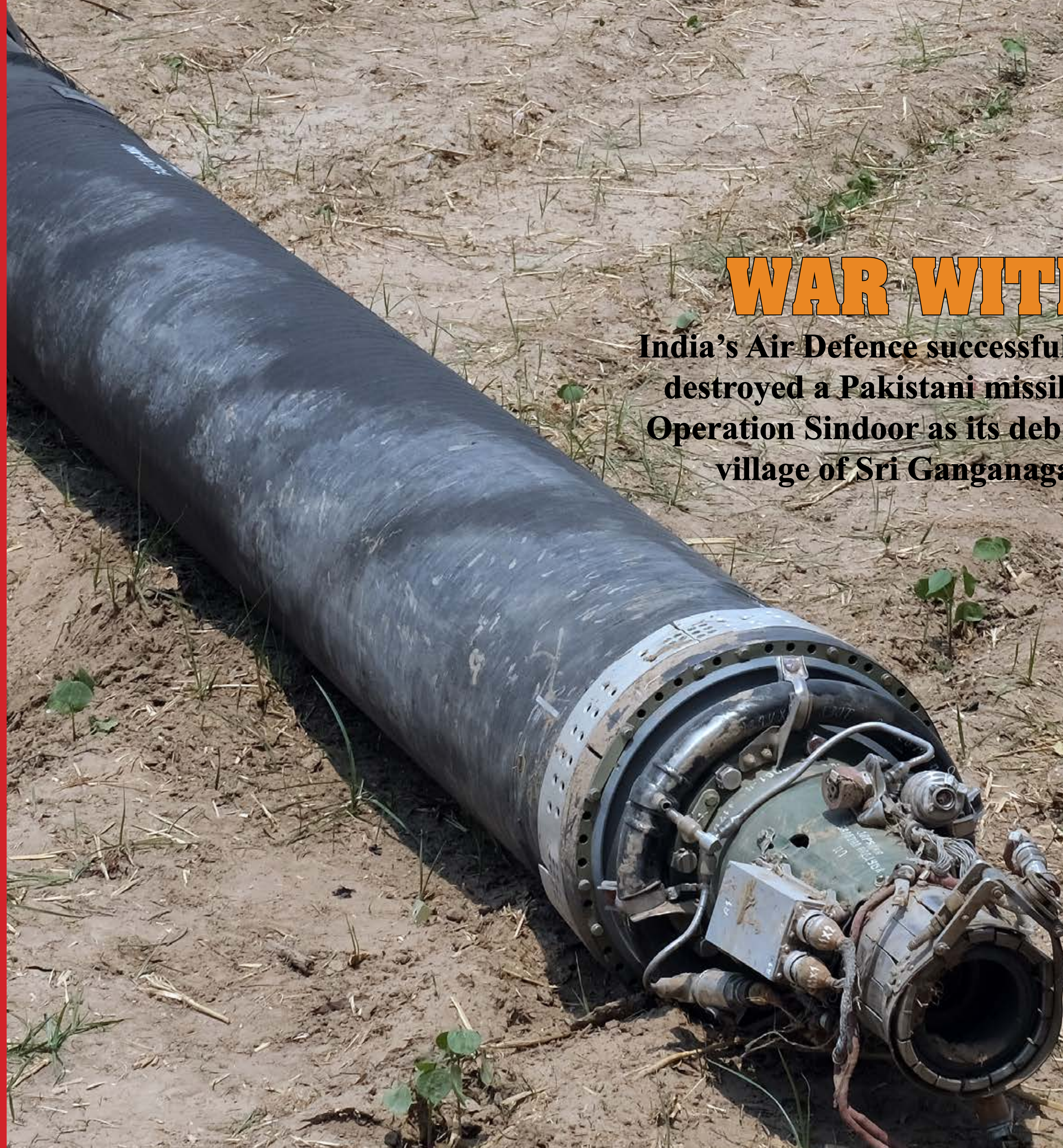

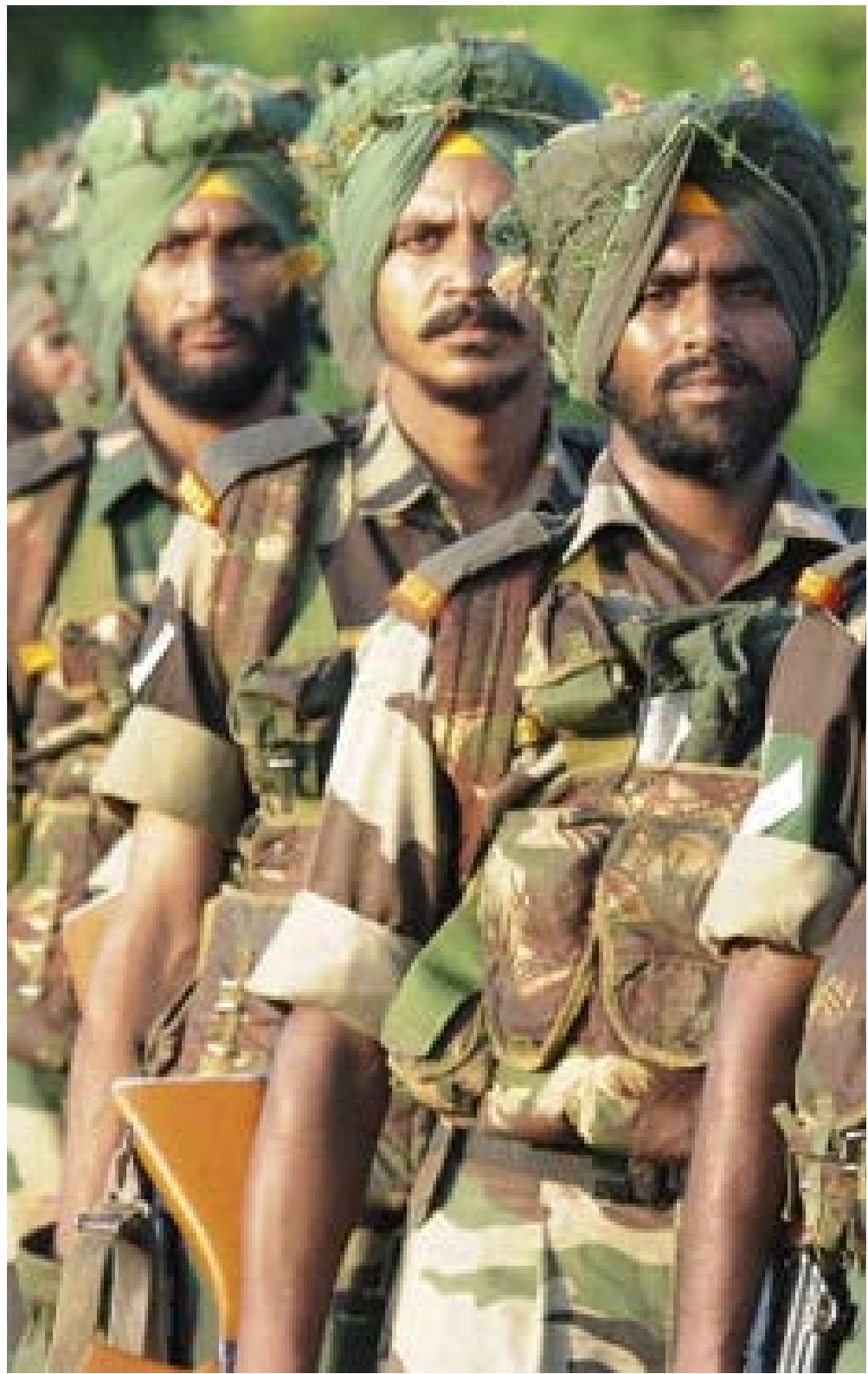

EDITORIAL

India has always believed in peace, dialogue, and diplomacy. It is a country that has consistently chosen maturity over aggression, even when repeatedly provoked. But there comes a time when silence is no longer a symbol of strength it becomes a burden. For years, India has endured the pain of cross-border terrorism. Be it the Uri attack, the Pathankot incident, or the devastating Pulwama bombing, Pakistan's involvement or backing of terror outfits has been evident. Each time, India responded with measured actions limited surgical strikes, stern warnings, and appeals to international forums. But the message was either misunderstood or deliberately ignored.

Then came the horrifying Pahalgam terror attack on April 22, 2025, where twenty-six innocent civilians lost their lives in the Baisaran Valley of Kashmir. These tourists had come to enjoy the beauty of nature, unaware that their lives would be cut short by a planned terrorist strike. Once again, investigations revealed the link to terror groups operating from Pakistan, a country that has repeatedly failed to dismantle the terror infrastructure thriving on its soil.

This is not just India's claim. It is a widely acknowledged global fact. In 2008, the Financial Action Task Force (FATF), the international body that monitors money laundering and terror financing, placed Pakistan on its grey list. This decision was based on Pakistan's repeated failure to curb the funding of terror networks and its inability or unwillingness to take action against organizations that plan and execute terror activities. Being on the FATF grey list has had serious implications for Pakistan's economy and international credibility, yet it has not led to meaningful change in its policies.

Faced with repeated loss of innocent lives and no sign of corrective action from Pakistan, India responded with Operation Sindoor on May 7, 2025. This was not an act of war, but a carefully planned counter-terror operation. Nine terrorist camps across Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Jammu and Kashmir were destroyed. No civilian homes, infrastructure, or lives were harmed. The mission sent a clear message: India will no longer tolerate attacks on its people. If terror continues to be nurtured across the border, it will be met with strength and precision.

India is a peaceful country. It has never believed in unnecessary confrontation. It values mutual respect, international cooperation, and regional harmony. But peace cannot come at the cost of innocent lives. When our citizens are targeted, when our security is challenged, and when our self-respect is threatened, India will defend itself. Not because we want war, but because we owe it to our people. Pakistan must now make a choice. Will it continue to harbor extremist elements and risk international isolation, or will it focus on rebuilding its own economy, stabilizing its society, and contributing to regional peace? The world is watching. Terrorism is not a weapon of diplomacy it is a curse that devours the very land that supports it.

Operation Sindoor was not an act of revenge. It was an act of responsibility. A message that India will not allow its patience to be mistaken for weakness. Peace will always remain our first choice, but our silence should never be misread as surrender. In the end, there are no real victors in war and terrorism. Only loss, pain, and years of recovery. And it is time the world and especially Pakistan understands this before it is too late.

The Pahalgam Terror Attack: Fear in a Land of Peace

Closer to home, in India, the beauty of Kashmir was overshadowed by a horrifying act of terrorism. On April 22, 2025, a terrorist attack took place in Baisaran Valley, Pahalgam, a place where tourists were enjoying the natural beauty with their families. Three terrorists reportedly entered the valley and began asking people about their religion. Those who were not Muslims, especially Hindus, were targeted and killed on the spot. Twenty-six innocent lives were lost that day.

This attack was not just an act of violence, but an attempt to create religious hatred and unrest. It sent a chilling message across the country: no place is truly safe. The impact of such acts is devastating not just on the victims and their families, but on the entire nation. Tourism declines, economic activity slows down, and people begin to live in fear. The atmosphere of peace is replaced by suspicion and anger.

Infrastructure bridges, schools, hospitals takes a long time to rebuild. **COAS LAUDS TROOPS FOR
VIGILANT DEFENCE ALONG
THE A FRONT**

General Upendra Dwivedi, Chief of the Army Staff (COAS) visited Laungewala in the forward areas of the Konark Corps in the desert sector on 19 May 2025 to congratulate the troops for their exemplary role during Operation SINDOOR and to review the joint actions undertaken in coordination with the Indian Air Force and the Border Security Force.

The desert stretches from Jaisalmer to the Kutch region witnessed a swift and coordinated operational response from the Indian Army, Indian Air Force, and BSF. These joint actions not only blunted enemy intent but also established a new normal in maintaining operational dominance along the western front. As part of Operation SINDOOR, the Indian Army undertook rapid deployment of surveillance assets and air defence systems, in close coordination with the IAF and BSF. The calibrated positioning of weapon systems and other operational enablers, aligned with civil administration support, ensured effective area domination and neutralisation of potential threats.

During his interaction with soldiers of the Konark Corps, the Army Chief exhorted a spirited “Shabash!”, acknowledging their valour, unwavering commitment, and dogged determination in defending the International Boundary. He praised the troops for their vigilant actions, including the successful neutralisation of enemy drone incursions, which effectively prevented any misadventure by the adversary in the desert theatre.

General Dwivedi also commended the commanders and units for their professionalism, high morale, and integrated execution of operational plans. He highlighted the Army’s tradition of honour and its unflinching readiness to meet future challenges with decisive force, reaffirming



the Indian Army’s commitment to safeguarding national sovereignty and ensuring high operational preparedness amidst a dynamic security environment. Among the most respected is the Dogra Regiment, established in 1877. This regiment has displayed extraordinary bravery in high-altitude warfare, especially during the Kargil War and the India-Pak wars of 1965 and 1971. Their motto Kartavyam Anvatama—"Duty is the soul"—perfectly reflects their spirit. The Assam Regiment, formed in 1941 and made up largely of soldiers from the Northeast, is a master of guerrilla tactics and difficult terrain combat. Their agility and resolve were notably demonstrated during World War II in Burma. The Parachute Regiment—India's elite special forces unit—was founded in 1945 and is known for lightning-fast, high-risk operations. It played a pivotal role in the 2016 surgical strikes across the LoC.

Their training in extreme conditions—be it jungle, desert, or snow—makes them one of the most feared units in the world. The Maratha Light Infantry, one of the oldest regiments raised in 1768, upholds the valorous traditions of the Maratha warriors. Their motto, Duty, Honour, Courage, captures their essence as warriors who are prepared for any mission under any condition.

The Sikh Regiment, established in 1846, is renowned for its fierce spirit and battlefield discipline. From World War II to the modern-day border conflicts, their war cry Sat Sri Akaal echoes through the battlefields, often shaking the confidence of the enemy. The Rajputana Rifles, the oldest infantry regiment of the Indian Army formed in 1775, is a master of close combat and martial tactics.

Their motto, Veer Bhogya Vasundhara—“The brave shall inherit the Earth”—was exemplified during their heroic role in the Kargil War. And then there is the Gorkha Regiment, established in 1815, whose very name strikes fear into the hearts of enemies. Known for their unmatched valor and iconic khukri blades, Gorkha soldiers are considered among the toughest in the world.

While the ceasefire offers a welcome pause in hostilities, it is ultimately the strength and readiness of these regiments that ensure its endurance. Their presence on the frontlines acts as both a deterrent and a guarantee that India’s borders will remain secure. These regiments are more than military units—they are the embodiment of India’s strength, pride, and unbreakable resolve. Peace may be the goal, but behind that peace stands the unwavering shield of Mother India.

TERRORISM AND TRACK

India-Pakistan Tensions: A Never-Ending Conflict Fueled by Terrorism

The tensions between India and Pakistan have remained one of the most persistent and deeply rooted conflicts in South Asia since 1948.



Marked by wars, border skirmishes, and diplomatic standoffs, this rivalry has cost both nations dearly economically, socially, and politically. Over the past decade alone, the region has witnessed war-like situations three times, each time shaking the fragile peace that exists between the two nuclear-armed neighbours.

On April 22, 2025, a horrifying terrorist attack occurred in the serene town of Pahalgam in Kashmir. Three heavily armed militants opened fire on a group of 26 civilians who had come to visit the picturesque Baisaran Valley. All 26 innocent tourists lost their lives in the attack. Tragically, this is not an isolated incident. Over the past ten years, multiple similar

attacks have occurred, each time shaking the collective conscience of the nation. The attackers in the Pahalgam incident were traced back to terrorist networks operating from Pakistani soil a pattern seen repeatedly.

Pakistan has long been accused of harbouring and supporting terrorist elements, both regionally and globally. The presence of Osama Bin Laden in Abbottabad, Pakistan, confirmed suspicions that it provides safe havens to some of the world's most wanted terrorists.

In response to the April 22 attack, India launched "Operation Sindoor" on May 7, 2025.

This meticulously planned military operation targeted

TERRORIST CAMPS IN POJK & PAKISTAN

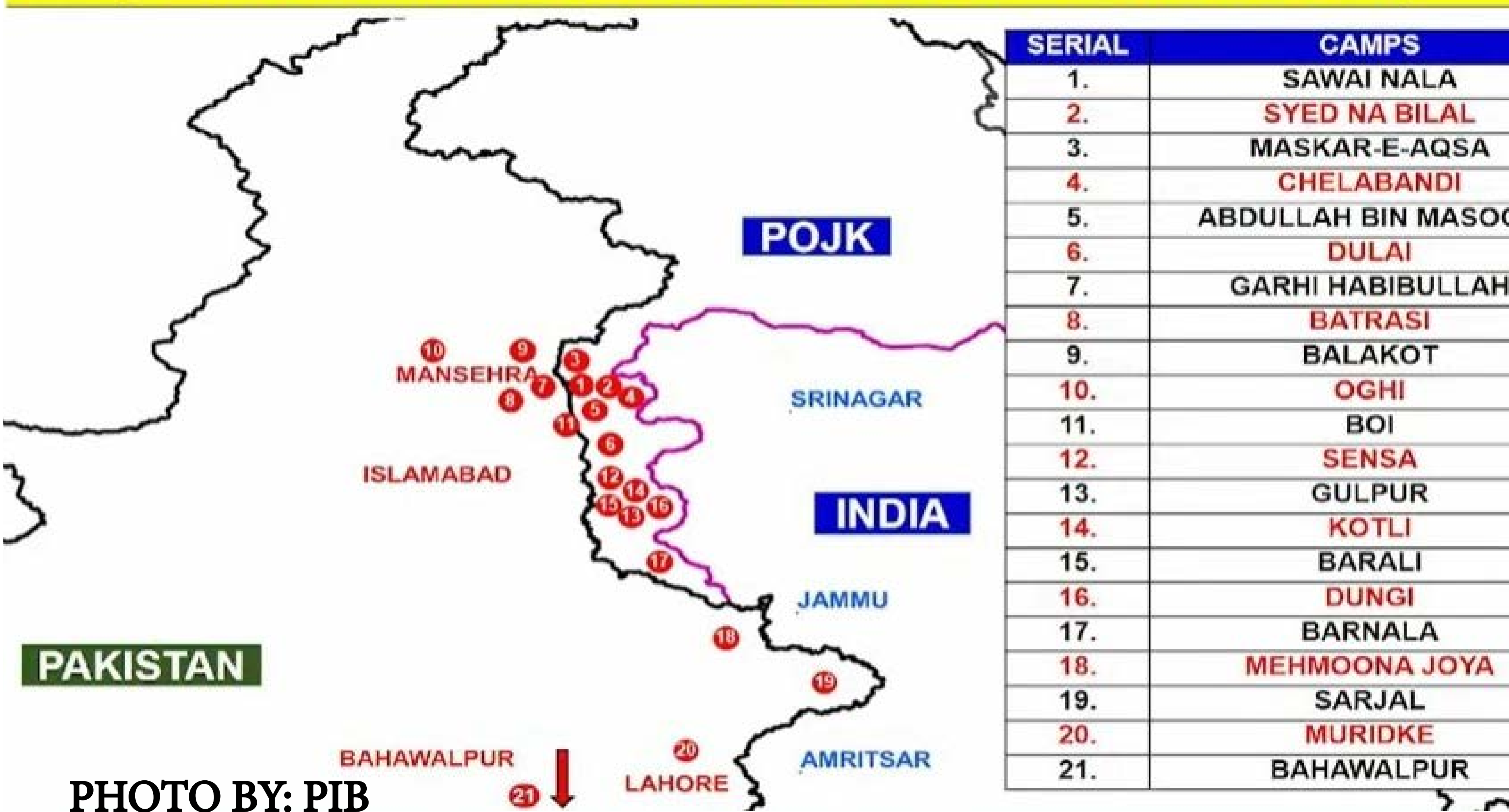

terrorist infrastructure across Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Jammu and Kashmir. This mission was not just a retaliation but a strong statement against the continuing export of terrorism across borders.

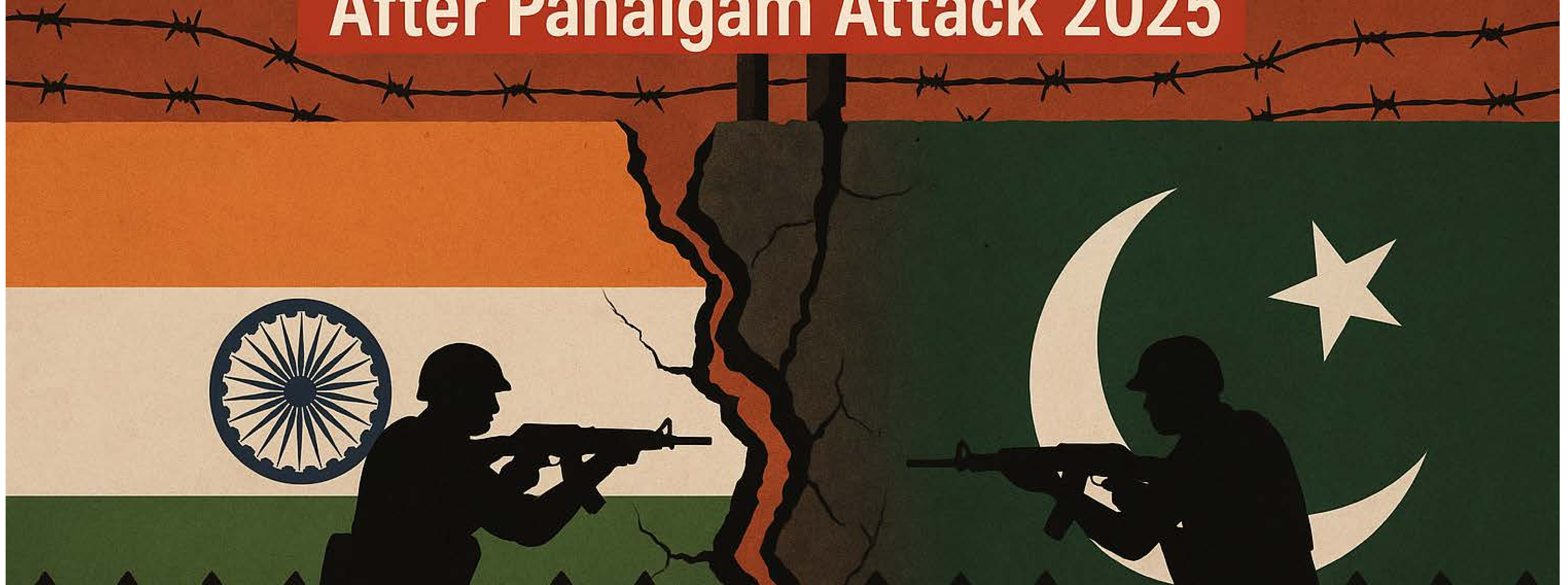
However, tensions escalated dramatically in the aftermath

ऑपरेशन सिंदूर की वीरांगनाएं: कर्नल सोफिया कुरैशी और विंग कमांडर व्योमिका सिंह

7 मई 2025 की सुबह, पूरा देश गर्व से भर गया जब भारतीय सेना की कर्नल सोफिया कुरैशी और भारतीय वायुसेना की विंग कमांडर व्योमिका सिंह ने ऑपरेशन सिंदूर पर मीडिया को जानकारी दी। ये वही ऑपरेशन था जो भारत ने जम्मू-कश्मीर के पहलगाम में 22 अप्रैल को हुए आतंकी हमले के जवाब में शुरू किया था। इस हमले में 26 निर्दोश नागरिकों की जान गई थी, जिनमें 25 भारतीय और 1 नेपाली नागरिक शामिल थे।

ऑपरेशन सिंदूर के तहत भारत ने पाकिस्तान और पाकिस्तान अधिकृत कश्मीर (पीओके) में स्थित 9 आतंकी ठिकानों को सफलतापूर्वक निशाना बनाया। यह कार्रवाई पूरी तरह से टारगेटेड थी, जिससे किसी भी आम नागरिक या आम ढांचे को नुकसान नहीं पहुंचा। लेकिन इस पूरे मिशन में सबसे खास और प्रेरणादायक पल वो था जब दो महिला अफसरों ने देश को इस ऑपरेशन की सफलता की जानकारी दी।

कर्नल सोफिया कुरैशी और विंग कमांडर व्योमिका सिंह केवल ऑपरेशन की ब्रिफिंग देने वाली अफसर नहीं थीं, बल्कि वे उस सोच और हौसले की प्रतीक हैं जो आज की भारतीय महिलाएं अपने अंदर लिए हुए हैं। जब उन्होंने मीडिया के सामने आत्मविश्वास के साथ खड़े होकर देश को बताया कि कैसे भारत ने आतंक के अड्डों को खत्म किया, तो हर भारतीय का सीना गर्व से चौड़ा हो गया।

आज महिलाएं सिर्फ घर और समाज तक सीमित नहीं हैं, वे देश की रक्षा में भी सबसे आगे खड़ी हैं। भारतीय सेना, वायुसेना और नौसेना में महिलाएं अब हर उस भूमिका में नजर आ रही हैं जो कभी सिर्फ पुरुषों तक सीमित मानी जाती थी। चाहे युद्ध क्षेत्र हो या रणनीति बनाने की जिम्मेदारी, महिलाएं हर मोर्चे पर अपनी काबिलियत साबित कर रही हैं।

कर्नल सोफिया और विंग कमांडर व्योमिका का ये कदम सिर्फ एक प्रेस कॉन्फ्रेंस नहीं था, बल्कि ये एक सशक्त संदेश था कि देश बेटियां अब सिर्फ सुरक्षा का भरोसा नहीं, बल्कि गर्व का कारण बन चुकी हैं। उनके आत्मविश्वास, नेतृत्व और समर्पण ने यह साबित कर दिया कि देश की रक्षा में अब जेंडर कोई रुकावट नहीं है।

अंत में यही कहा जा सकता है कि जब देश की बेटियां बॉर्डर पर खड़ी हों, तो हर नागरिक निश्चित होकर चैन की नींद सो सकता है। कर्नल सोफिया कुरैशी और विंग कमांडर व्योमिका सिंह जैसे अफसर न सिर्फ आने वाली पीढ़ियों के लिए प्रेरणा हैं, बल्कि वे इस सच्चाई को मजबूत करते हैं कि भारत की सुरक्षा अब और भी मजबूत हाथों में है और ये हाथ सिर्फ पुरुषों के नहीं, बल्कि महिलाओं के भी हैं।
